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What is Youth Empowerment Services?

The state of Idaho offers a new system of care for children with serious mental health needs and their families. It's called Youth Empowerment Services, or YES. YES gives families, healthcare providers, educators and counselors new tools to identify children with mental health needs. YES also improves access to the resources families need to improve their child's mental health.

This new system of care is designed to look at the strengths and needs of the child/youth and their caregivers. This means the child/youth and their family drive the decisions of the treatment planning team. The plan is designed to meet the child's and family's needs, with appropriate services and supports located in the child's community.

What is Serious Emotional Disturbance?

A child with serious emotional disturbance, or SED, has a mental, behavioral or emotional issue that limits their ability to participate in family, school or community activities. A new tool, the Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) will be used in Idaho to measure functional impairment and to help guide treatment planning and measure effectiveness.

Qualifying Diagnosable Mental Illness + Substantial Functional Impairment = SED

What Changes are Now in Effect with YES?

Medicaid Independent Assessor, Liberty Healthcare, is available to assess children who may have a serious emotional disturbance (SED). This assessment is required for:

- Families with incomes up to 300 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) who are not currently eligible for Medicaid but want to apply for Medicaid coverage for their child who potentially has SED; or
- Families who are currently on Medicaid who wish to access Medicaid-covered respite services for their child with SED. Medicaid will pay for respite services that are identified on a person-centered service plan as one of the service needs of the child. Person-centered service planning is a process directed by the individual and family to identify the strengths, capacities, preferences, needs and desired outcomes of the individual to create a treatment plan. *Note: Person-centered service planning is only available to Medicaid members.*

Contracts for providers serving Medicaid and Division of Behavioral Health have been updated to include requirements for using and demonstrating use of the YES Principles of Care and Practice Model.
